Volunteer of the Year



Life-long McFarland resident Tim Mitchell is our Volunteer of the Year. After 39 years, Tim retired from Wisconsin Power and Light and soon became the consummate volunteer. He helps family, neighbors and local organizations. Tim has been a Lion's Club member for many years where he enjoys building playgrounds and doing vision screening for young children. He cooks on his grill for the McFarland Lutheran Church "Holy Smokes" picnic supper and Vacation Bible School. Tim joined the McFarland Historical Society board of directors in 2004 and served about six years. When the museum needed a new furnace, Tim got his brother-in-law Kevin Macke to give advice and Tim helped with the installation. Tim maintained the building by cleaning gutters and doing various projects. When the Larson House was restored in 2014, Tim was recruited for the mowing crew and continues to serve by mowing and trimming once a month during the growing season. He aerates the lawn as needed and hauls away brush in his 1970 truck. Tim and his wife Jane help with the

s part of the McFarland Community Festival, board members hosted a new family event titled "Early Days of McFarland." They used the "Pioneer Days" event from the past as a model and embellished it to include more children and family activities including photos and information about McFarland's First Peoples. McFarland resident and member of the Potawatomi Nation, Art Shegonee loaned his teepee poles and drum for the event. He also attended dressed in his elaborate regalia. Dawn Shegonee presented history regarding the recent "Land Acknowledgement" and "Call for Peace" events. Board members and other volunteers led corn-shelling, wool-spinning, lefse-making, apple-pressing, ice cream-making, butter-churning, log-cutting, and cornhusk doll-making activities that kept young and old engaged. Making "button buzzers" and creating corn cob/feather "darts" were also fun activities. The museum, Skare log cabin and early farming exhibit were all open for visitors.
